The Campbell Town Town Hall will be sold off by the Northern Midlands Council after it commissioned a report for its future use.

The council decided to sell the building during the closed section of its March meeting, before it released its decision publicly.

However, the council noted it intended to sell the building back in October as mayor Mary Knowles said it could not keep up with the cost of maintaining older buildings.

The building is used by the Campbell Town Museum and Visitor Information Centre and for monthly markets."

Community input sought on Campbell Town Hall decision
Northern Midlands Council will proceed with plans to notify the community of its intention to sell the Campbell Town Hall, after the decision was made at its meeting on 15 March 2021.

Mayor Mary Knowles OAM said Council had been reviewing its assets for some time and considering consolidation to ensure it was able to maintain current infrastructure in a sustainable way.

"The decision to initiate the process to sell was made after several years of careful review, consultation and investigation into use of the Town Hall," Mayor Knowles said.

"Despite the decision of Council, this is not something that will occur immediately.

"The Town Hall is a public facility, therefore Council must, prior to placing the property on the market, go through a rigorous process set out in the Local Government Act 1993 to publicly advertise and seek comment on the decision.

"In doing so, we will notify all current tenants and frequent users of the intention to sell the Hall, as well as advertising this decision to the wider community, both in our local newspaper and by displaying a physical notice on the boundary of the property," she said.

The community will have 21 days from the date of the first advertisement in the newspaper to object to the proposed sale, as well as present viable reasons for the Hall to remain property of Northern Midlands Council.

"If objections are received Council will consider these and decide whether or not to proceed with the planned sale," Mayor Knowles said.

"Any individual who lodges an objection will be notified of the outcome and their right to appeal.

"If no objections are received, Council will proceed with the sale," she said.

Regional Recovery Committees – Initial Terms of Reference

Purpose & Roles

The Tasmanian Government (the Government) has formed the [REGION NAME] Regional Recovery Committee ([N/NW/S]RRC), for an initial period of two years, to:

- identify the specific impacts of COVID-19 on [REGION NAME] and the region's priorities for recovery;
- recommend government-led recovery activities, and enable community-led recovery activities; and
- support the Government in the ongoing response to and recovery from COVID-19.

Identify

1. Build a detailed understanding of the specific impacts of COVID-19 in [REGION NAME]
2. Agree on the priorities for regional recovery activity in [REGION NAME]

Recommend and Enable

3. Provide advice and recommendations to the Government regarding regional recovery priorities
4. Identify, enable, and provide high-level coordination of community-led regional recovery activities.

Support

5. Support the Government to implement the recommendations of the Premier's Economic and Social Advisory Council (PESRAC), as well as in its ongoing emergency response to COVID-19
6. Assist businesses, communities, individuals, and organisations in [REGION NAME] to access the existing resources and support that are available for recovery from COVID-19
7. Help to build the overall preparedness, resilience and collaborative ability of communities and organisations in the [REGION NAME] region.

Background to the formation of the Regional Recovery Committees is provided at *Attachment A* to these Terms of Reference.

Sub-regional frameworks

In fulfilling each of its primary roles, the [N/NW/S]RRC will need to establish appropriate sub-regional frameworks to ensure that the work of the RRC is capturing the diverse needs and priorities, as well as strengths and opportunities, of various sectors and communities throughout the region. This could include:

- interviews or calls for submissions;
- roundtable or town-hall meetings;
- the creation of specific sub-committees to deal with more substantial issues;
- working groups to undertake specific recovery activities; or
- delegation to existing regional or sub-regional groups or organisations.

Term

The [N/NW/S]RRC will serve for an initial period of two years to 30 June 2023.

Membership

Members of the [N/NW/S]RRC are appointed by the State Recovery Advisor, on behalf of the Premier.

The [N/NW/S]RRC will be formed with the following nine (9) members:

- one [REGION NAME]-based State Government representative;
- one [REGION NAME]-based Commonwealth representative;
- the Mayor of one predominantly rural [REGION NAME] local council;
- the Mayor of one predominantly urban [REGION NAME] local council;
- one [REGION NAME] business or business sector organisation;
- one [REGION NAME] social services sector organisation;
- two community members living in [REGION NAME]; and
- one young person (18-24 years) living in [REGION NAME];

Replacement of members

If a member can no longer participate in the [N/NW/S]RRC, their position will be filled by:

- if an organisational representative – the vacating member nominating an alternative representative of their organisation (to be agreed with the [N/NW/S]RRC and State Recovery Advisor);
- if a community representative – another nominee from the original expression of interest process being identified and appointed (to be agreed with the [N/NW/S]RRC and State Recovery Advisor).

Additional members

If the [N/NW/S]RRC believes that its permanent membership does not fully represent the regional perspectives or expertise required to enable recovery from COVID-19, the RRC (via its Co-Chairs) may request that additional members be added to the [N/NW/S]RRC. This request will be made to the State Recovery Advisor, via the COVID-19 Recovery Branch as secretariat.

Time-limited representatives

If required, the [N/NW/S]RRC (via its Co-Chairs) may request that specific representatives or experts be asked to join the committee for a limited period of time, to support a specific piece of work being undertaken. This request will be made to the State Recovery Advisor, via the COVID-19 Recovery Branch as secretariat.

Committee Chair and Secretariat

The first meeting of the [N/NW/S]RRC will be convened by the State Recovery Advisor. Once established, with the agreement of the Committee, RRC meetings will be co-chaired by the two Local Government Mayors. The Co-Chairs may make their own arrangements to ensure effective conduct of meetings and other committee activities, again with the agreement of the Committee.

The COVID-19 Recovery Branch (Department of Premier and Cabinet) will provide secretariat support to the [N/NW/S]RRC throughout its term.

Quorum and proxies

A meeting quorum will be a minimum of five (5) members, and must include at least one Local Government representative, one State Government representative, and two of three community / youth representatives.

Proxies will be considered on a case-by-case basis if necessary, by agreement of the committee and recommendation of the Chair(s) to the State Recovery Advisor.

Decision-making and conflict resolution

Decision making of the [N/NW/S]RRC will follow a three tiered process for resolution:

1. In the first instance, Co-Chairs will seek consensus on all decisions. All efforts should be made to reach consensus, including through the potential deferral of decisions (where appropriate), before proceeding.
2. If consensus cannot be reached, all members except Co-Chairs will cast a simple majority vote.
3. If the vote is tied, the Co-Chairs will also vote in order to break the tie.

Expectations and Responsibilities

Of Members

Each member of the [N/NW/S]RRC is appointed to represent a particular sector, demographic or community within the [REGION NAME] region, with a particular focus on groups impacted by COVID-19 and Tasmania's response to it. As such, members are expected to:

- faithfully provide as complete a representation as possible of the views, interests, and aspirations of community or sector the member has been asked to represent; and
- regularly seek feedback and input from other members of their sector or community, and feed any views and advice received into the decision-making processes of the committee.

As secretariat, the COVID-19 Recovery Branch (Department of Premier and Cabinet) will support members to fulfill these responsibilities.

Of the Committee

The [N/NW/S]RRC – led by its Co-Chairs and with support from the COVID-19 Recovery Branch (Department of Premier and Cabinet) – has a collective responsibility to ensure that:

- all members of the [N/NW/S]RRC – particularly community representatives – feel well-supported and able to contribute effectively to the decisions and work of the committee;
- the committee meets regularly at a time and place that suits all members, with a clear agenda, agreed meeting principles and behaviours, and equitable deliberation and decision-making.
- the committee is meeting the expectations set out in these terms of reference, and does not commit to activity outside of the scope of these terms of reference;
- the committee has the resources it needs to carry out its work, and does not commit to activity outside of what can be achieved with available or identified resources;
- as the committee undertakes its work, the committee and its members are appropriately engaged with and accessible to relevant communities and organisations in the [REGION NAME] region;
- the committee remains committed to the principles of accountability and transparency, with all decisions made by the committee – including the rationale for why particular priorities or recovery activities have been chosen – communicated in an accessible, clear, and timely way.
- the committee is well-governed and is fulfilling the commonly accepted duties of a community committee, in broad alignment with the principles for community-based boards set out by the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.¹

ATTACHMENT A – BACKGROUND TO THE FORMATION OF RRCs

- On 30 April 2020, the Tasmanian Government formed the Premier's Social and Economic Advisory Council (PESRAC), to provide advice to the Premier on strategies and initiatives to support the short to medium, and the longer term recovery from COVID-19.
- PESRAC provided an interim report on 20 July 2020, which contained the following recommendation:
Interim Report Recommendation 63: The State Government should implement a regionally-based model for coordinating the recovery journey.
- PESRAC provided its final report on 16 March 2021, which contained the following recommendation:
Final Report Recommendation 35: The State Government and its agencies should actively seek out and fund community-led, place-based recovery activities. Priority should be given to activities with the following objectives:
 - *increased community connection including collaboration across existing community organisations;*
 - *primary prevention of, and early intervention in, areas such as family or community violence and drug and alcohol misuse; and*
 - *models which promote new and innovative strategies to engage volunteers."*
- The three Regional Recovery Committees (RRCs), and their initial terms of reference, have been formed by the Government to fulfill these recommendations. RRCs have been formed by the State Recovery Advisor through Section 24E of the *Emergency Management Act (2006)*.

That LGAT lobby the State Government to increase resourcing for cat management and control of weeds.

Deleted: reject the continual cost shifting exercise
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Background Comments: (Detailed background comment is required to ensure a complete understanding of what is being sought)

Cat management is an ongoing issue in local government areas. Feral and stray cats cause a range of issues, including but not limited to: killing wildlife, spread of disease such as toxoplasmosis and trespass onto neighbouring properties.

The *Cat Management Act 2009* requires cat owners to desex their cats, however, this is not enforced by either local or state government. The *Cat Management Act 2009* requirements do not assist in the management of feral cats, which, particularly in rural areas are a serious issue.

The State Government has developed the Tasmanian Cat Management Plan 2017-2022. The development of the plan is a step in the right direction to more effective cat management, however, it raises concerns about the expectation of local government to achieve the objectives set out in the plan.

The State Government should fund the enforcement of the *Cat Management Act 2009* and allocate funding and support to implement the objectives of the Cat Management Plan, with particular focus on a strategy to bring feral cat populations under control.

Weed management is an ongoing issue in local government areas. The *Weed Management Act 1999* is the central legislation covering weed control and eradication in Tasmania. It is the responsibility of the State Government to enforce the *Weed Management Act 1999*, however it is noted that a Council, with the approval of the Secretary may appoint any person as an inspector for the purposes of the *Weed Management Act 1999*.

The Northern Midlands Council is receiving an increase in reports of declared weeds within its municipality. Council does not have an appointed inspector and its protocol is to write to the property owner advising Council has received a report of a declared weed, requesting removal, and also notifying the Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment.

It would appear the Department of Primary Industries, Parks, Water and Environment does not have adequate resources to deal with the volume of complaints regarding weeds and thus enforcement action is rare.

The State Government should fund the resources to adequately enforce the *Weed Management Act 1999*.

That LGAT lobby the State Government to urgently review recent Resource Management and Planning Appeal Tribunal and Supreme Court planning decisions with a view to amending the statewide planning scheme provisions to take account of any recent issues and to ensure loopholes are not exploited resulting in development contrary to the intention of the provision of the scheme.

Background Comments: (Detailed background comment is required to ensure a complete understanding of what is being sought)

The Northern Midlands Council was recently unsuccessful in the appeal of *Northern Midlands Council v Smith* [2021] TASSC 8.

In 2018 the Northern Midlands Council approved an application for visitor accommodation on a Rural Resource zoned property.

In 2019 the Northern Midlands Council received an application for a permit to subdivide that property into two lots in order to place the existing house on one lot and the approved visitor accommodation on another lot.

Clause 26.4.2 P1 b) of the zone requires that subdivision is for the purpose of creating a lot for an approved non-agricultural use other than a residential use.

The application was approved with a condition that a Part 5 agreement be entered covenanting the lot in question to be used only for visitor accommodation.

The decision was appealed to the Resource Management Planning Approvals Tribunal who upheld the appeal. The condition was removed.

Council appealed the Tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court. The appeal was dismissed.

Subdivision of the original property could not have been approved if it was for residential use, due to it being in the Rural Resource Zone. Subdivision was allowable under the performance criteria for development of visitor accommodation in the Rural Resource Zone. However, once a building for visitor accommodation has been erected, there is great difficulty in enforcing that the building

is not used in future for residential use, given the definition of visitor accommodation in Planning Directive 6 allowing for it to be provided to the general public at no cost. There is no way to ensure protection of the Rural Resource Zone objectives and provisions due to this loophole.

Council is now concerned that a precedent has been set for a loophole to be exploited in the planning scheme and seeks support to amend the state provisions to close this loophole.
